MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

The Canadian Dermatology Association (CDA) remains a leader within the medical speciality societies' community.

Throughout 2018, the CDA continuously excelled, and our 838 members have reaped the benefits of the Association's performance. We made substantial progress in areas of strategic importance. We devoted significant investments in strengthening the profile of dermatology with stakeholders, peer groups, industry, international communities and most importantly the Canadian public.

In 2018, we had an impressive series of firsts.

One of these firsts, was the Women in Dermatology Leadership Meeting held in partnership with the Women's Dermatologic Society. This one-day accredited event featured North American leaders in dermatology who spoke about their personal and professional experiences and shared insights and tools used to achieve work/life balance.

A second first was hosting the 4th Annual International Conference on UV and Skin Cancer Prevention in partnership with Ryerson University and American-based Klein-Buendel and Associates. One hundred and fifty delegates from 17 countries and eight provinces attended the event consisting of 84 presentations spanning an assortment of dermatological-related topics.

Another first was going digital by adding JCMS Podcasts - Author Interviews to our JCMS CME offerings that resulted in 990 downloads from its launch in June to December 31st. This was quickly expanded to include Speaker Interviews based on key speakers at the Annual Conference held in Montreal.

At the 2018 Annual Conference we introduced more focused programming. Delegates were offered concurrent medical, surgical and cosmetic workshops. Residents were invited to write a conference review for the eBulletin and receive a scholarship, and those interested in research were invited to a pilot session on Building an Academic Career.

As proud as we are for our firsts, we are also maintaining what sustains the CDA. There are numerous instances in 2018 where the CDA advanced positions to help improve patient care. The CDA created blue adhesive notepads for TCI prescriptions that include our position statement. When the Canadian Agency for Drugs and Technologies Health decided to deny reimbursement to patients

suffering from moderate to severe eczema on public insurance for the cost of Dupixent™ the CDA, along with the Canadian Society of Allergy and Clinical Immunology, responded with a position statement. The CDA also made recommendations to Health Canada to improve the two new sunscreen monographs. When Shoppers Drug Mart announced their new Beauty Clinics in December, the CDA actively engaged with other specialty societies to come together to protect public safety. Members undertook these initiatives on top of their local efforts at events across Canada that served to heighten the CDA's visibility with the public through in-person interactions outside the office and traditional media and social media.

At the beginning of 2018, the CDA launched a Reporting of Misrepresentation form on the Members Only section of the website to support the efforts of the Future of Dermatology Working Group. Ipsos, a market research firm, was retained to assess stakeholders' perceptions of dermatology. Twenty-five percent of our members contributed to the survey.

Many CDA members raised the profile of the Association across Canada and around the world. For example, Dr. Julie Powell attended the Regional Dermatology Training Center's annual CME program as a speaker in Moshi, Tanzania. The Centre is an initiative funded in part by the CDA since its creation in 1990. Dr. Powell also joined us in Vietnam for the International League of Dermatological Societies Stakeholder meeting where we participated in the ILDS' strategic prioritising, presented in the plenaries and workshops, and connected with the British and Australian Societies' CEOs.

The CDA has proven it can grow and increase its reach year after year in Canada and abroad while sustaining the trust of those we serve. We believe these traits help the CDA stand out amongst its peers and impact change.

We are a forward focused association, shaping the future of dermatology by providing continuing professional development for our members; supporting and advancing patient care; and raising awareness through thought-provoking public education campaigns that ultimately benefits our members and their patients. To remain at the forefront, the CDA continues to raise the bar and set the standards for innovation.

In the last quarter of 2018, the Board of Directors approved a new three-year strategic plan with a new mission and vision. The new mission is to provide maximum member satisfaction and the vision is to be *the reference* for medical-speciality societies. The latter is a role we take on regularly as others seek our advice regarding our product recognition programs, association management and most recently our relationship and work with the CDF.

The skill and passion of our membership were on full display in 2018 here in Canada and around the world. The

CDA Board of Directors is proud to support you in providing quality patient care. Together, we are creating and shaping a sustainable CDA for the future.

We look forward to setting the standards and finding new and innovative ways to create value for all our stakeholders in the new year and beyond. Thank you to the members and the CDA staff for another fantastic year.

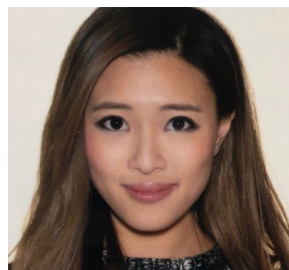

FUTURE OF DERMATOLOGY

The Future of Dermatology initiative made great strides since its inception in 2017. The working group behind this program has been working diligently to lay the foundation to ensure success.

To support the Future of Dermatology program, the Working Group contracted Ipsos, a research firm, to conduct market research that consisted of focus groups with the general public and family physicians and quantitative analysis. Ipsos surveyed a representative sample of 1,004 Canadians and 128 dermatologists. The results will be shared with the Board in January 2019.

By having the market research data in hand, the Future of Dermatology Working Group will be able to move forward to fine-tune next steps.

Reaching the public is a vital tactic of the Future of Dermatology's strategy. As an Association, we have made progress in educating the public about the benefits of a dermatologist and educating people about the importance of sunscreen. However, we cannot afford to rest on our laurels. We need to continue to reinforce the public's knowledge about our specialty and extensive training, and how the certified dermatologist is the right medical specialist to diagnose and treat dermatologic conditions. In the end, we must meet Canadians where they are and help them understand the value of a certified dermatologist.

To address the issue of misrepresentation of the word dermatology, the CDA created and launched the "Report Misrepresentation" form on the Members' Only section of the website. This initiative has led to 16 submissions of misrepresentation by medical professionals across Canada. Of these cases, four were individuals who had misleading advertising, which resulted in official letter of complaint from the CDA to their respective provincial colleges.

With the rapid expansion of teledermatology, the Future of Dermatology Working Group commissioned a report on Telemedicine and Teledermatology in Canada to be released in 2019.

To maintain and grow our position as the leaders in dermatology, the Working Group has determined that we need to augment the dermatology content on the CDA website. At the Annual Conference, six dermatologists took part in the filming of videos on Rosacea, Eczema, Acne, Melanoma, sun protection and cosmetic fillers, intended for the general public. The roll-out of these videos on the CDA website and social media platforms began in September 2018 during Acne Awareness Month and will continue throughout 2019.

Finally, new content was developed for vitiligo, urticaria, birthmarks, dermal fillers and injectable neurotoxin and will be published on the Association's website and as Disease Awareness brochures for members to give to their patients.

There are undoubtedly exciting days ahead for the Future of Dermatology Working Group with all the opportunities to increase awareness of the benefits dermatology provides and the role of the specialty in supporting patients and frontline practitioners.

MEMBERSHIP

The Membership and Awards Committee's main objectives are to encourage and promote membership growth through recruitment, engagement and retention, as well as, proposing members for both internal and external awards.

The CDA wants to acknowledge the contributions of Drs Micheline Collins, Ralph Florence, Janice Liao, Lynette Margesson and Norman Shiffman to the advancement of dermatology and the CDA over the span of their careers. As they set off to enjoy retirement, we want to wish them the best and welcome them to the Members-400 hours-or-less group.

Buidling on the aforementioned successful membership recruitment campaign, the CDA will continue with the enrolment drive in early 2019, by promoting the advantages and benefits of membership to non-member dermatologists. If you have colleagues who are not members, please encourage them to join the CDA. A strong, larger unified national voice benefits us all.

To help increase our voice, the CDA has implemented the Future of Dermatology Action Plan. As part of the Public Awareness Campaign to raise the profile of certified dermatologists members have been invited to download the CDA member logo. Members can use the logo on websites, correspondence and marketing materials. The 2019 logo is available for download at dermatology.ca. The Membership and Awards Committee encourages all members to use this valuable tool to help identify themselves as a certified dermatologist.

The CDA Awards program recognizes and celebrates dynamic individuals who are doing or have done exceptional work to promote the specialty. The Membership and Awards Committee is responsible for evaluating and selecting the CDA award winners each year. 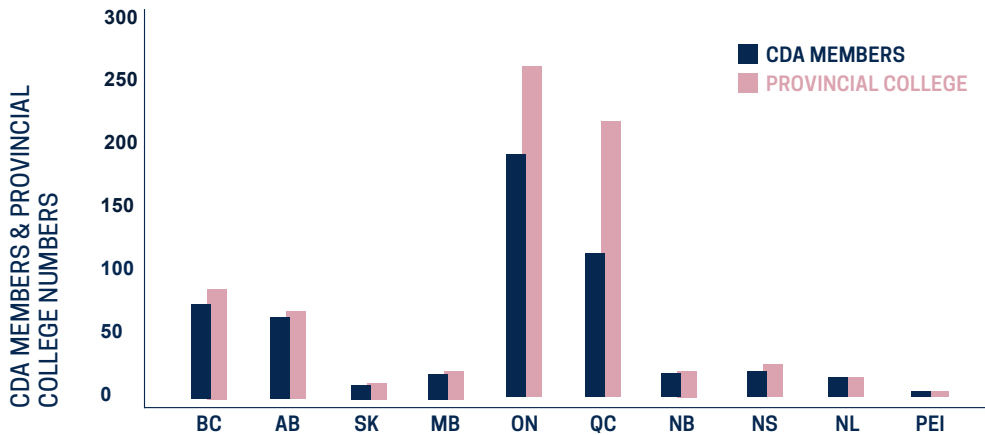

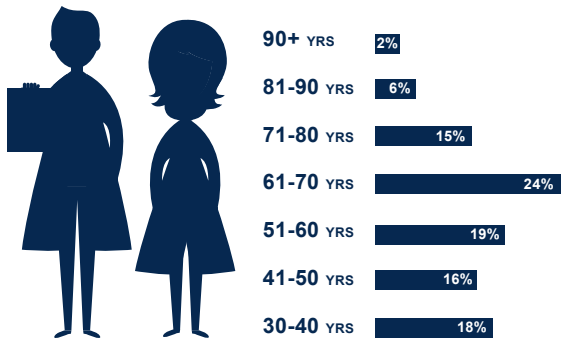
PRO-RATED MEMBERSHIP FEE FOR NEW CERTIFICANTS

CDA continues to offer new certificants, who join the Association during the last six months of the year, a pro-rated membership fee of 50%, following their complimentary year of membership.

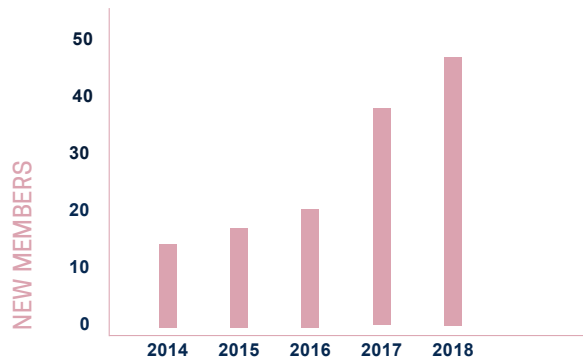
DERMATOLOGISTS PER PROVINCE

ANNUAL CONFERENCE PODCASTS

Going digital took the CDA to a new level at the 2018 Annual Conference. For the first time, the Association created podcasts onsite with some of this year's invited conference speakers. Host, Dr. Mark Kirchof interviewed an assortment of interviewees. The lineup included CBC Radio's Terry O'Reilly on Marketing Your Practice, Dr. Vaneeta Sheth on Disorders of Pigmentation in Ethnic Skin, Dr. Mark Davis on Classification and Therapies for Neutrophilic Disorders, Dr. Kathleen Hectorne on How to be Efficient on the Job, Dr. Jerry Shapiro on Medical Hair Loss, Dr. Mary Maloney on Managing Risks of Surgery in Dermatology Practice, and Prof. Luca Borradori on Treatment on Bullous Pemphigoid Diseases. WOMEN IN DERMATOLOGY LEADERSHIP MEETING

A new national education initiative for women in dermatology, the Women in Dermatology Leadership Meeting, was held for the first time in April 2018 in collaboration with the Women's Dermatologic Society. CO-DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

ACCREDITATION SERVICES

The CDA received and approved fifteen accreditation applications for CME programs developed for dermatologists and dermatology residents in 2018.

EARLY DERMATOLOGY RESEARCHER SCHOLARSHIP

The Early Dermatology Researcher Scholarship program, now in its third year, supports the attendance of dermatology researchers from PGY-3 to seven years' post-certification at key international dermatology congresses. In 2018, 17 applicants received registration and travel assistance to attend various international dermatology congresses. The scholarship funding was made possible thanks to an unrestricted educational grant from Eli Lilly.

DERMATOLOGY START-UP ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Supported by the Dermatology Start-up Assistance Working Group, the Program aims to prepare and support dermatology residents and early career dermatologists transitioning into practice. Through a dedicated online Practice Management Centre, the program provides helpful resources for early career dermatologists, including recordings from Practice Management presentations at Annual Conferences, links to provincial recruiting agencies, and other useful national and province-specific information.

EDUCATION ABSTRACT REVIEWS

The Education Committee participated in the review of 147 abstracts in 2018. Special thanks to the Annual Conference Committee and Subspecialty Chairs who also participated in the adjudication process.

CDA RESIDENT & FELLOW EDUCATION BURSARY

Funded initially by the CDA, the CDA Resident & Fellow Education Bursary provides financial support to residents in PGY-3 to PGY-5 who had an abstract accepted for presentation in oral or poster format at the Annual Conference. With new funding made available through the Dermatology Start-up Assistance Program, eligibility has now been extended to all residents and fellows and expanded to include attendance at the new Practice Management sessions for those not presenting at the annual conference. Celgene supports the CDA Practice Management sessions through the CDA's Corporate Supporter Program.



HEALTH POLICY

NEW SUNSCREEN MONOGRAPHS

In November, the CDA was invited by Health Canada to comment on two new sunscreen monographs – one for primary and one for secondary sunscreen products – that were drafted to align with the Federal Department's new self-care product framework.

The CDA conditionally supported the addition of two new primary sunscreen medicinal ingredients and made several recommendations relating to the application/reapplication instructions in both monographs. The CDA also recommended that a UV risk and safety message be required on all applicable secondary sunscreens, and that thought be given to no longer accepting sunscreen applications with an SPF less than 30.

POSITION STATEMENTS

Seven position statements covering dupilumab, topical calcineurin inhibitors, isotretinoin, artificial tanning, self-tanning products, and nanoparticles in sunscreens were added or updated by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Advisory Board and the Sun Awareness Working Group in 2018. These and nine other position statements are accessible on the CDA website.

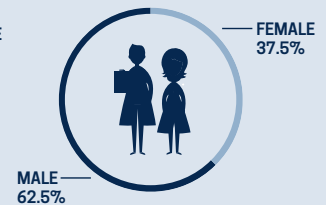

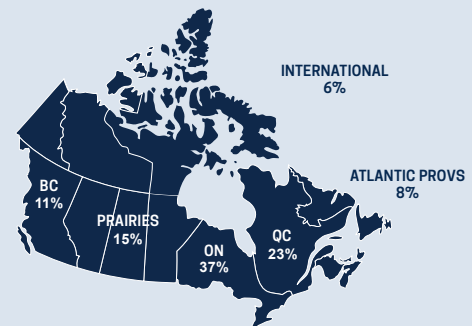

eBULLETIN

Since its launch in 2016, the eBulletin website has continued to grow and develop to meet member needs. New in 2018, the eBulletin features a ‘what’s new’ column, which compiles and highlights all newly published pieces in one location so members can quickly access the latest updates. Earlier this year the CDA established the **Annual Conference Resident Contributor Bursary** whereby three residents receive \$1,000 each to write summary highlights on seven Annual

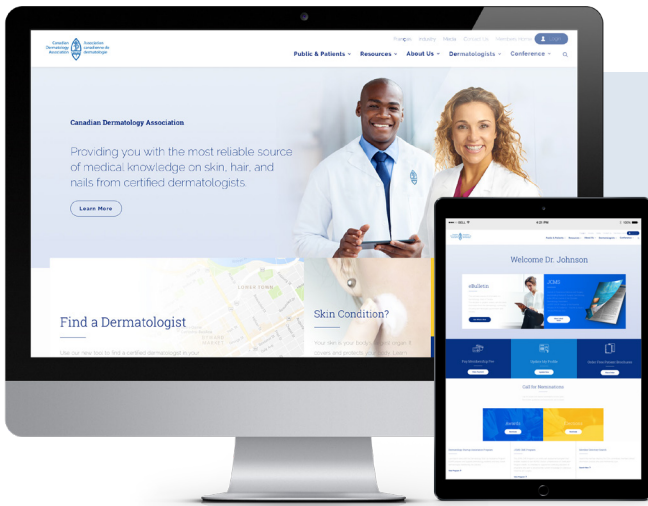

JOURNAL OF CUTANEOUS MEDICINE AND SURGERY

Launched in 2017, the JCMS CME Program provides members with an opportunity to earn RCPSC Section 3 Maintenance of Certification Program Credits. The program is funded by Eli Lilly, through an educational grant and recognized under the CDA’s Corporate Supporter Program. In 2018, the JCMS CME program identified 12 articles in Volume 22 of the JCMS for participants to review, conduct a self-assessment on their understanding through multiple choice test, and earn CME credits. 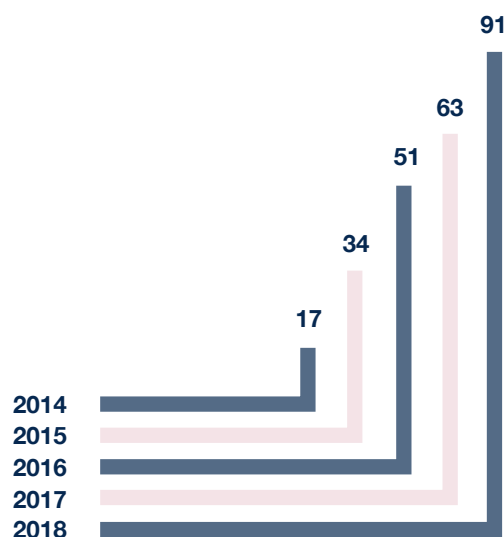

SUN AWARENESS PROGRAM

INTERNATIONAL UV CONFERENCE



From May 1st to 4th, 2018, one hundred and fifty delegates working in dermatology, skin cancer prevention, ultraviolet (UV) radiation science, architecture, and other allied behavioural and clinical disciplines from 17 countries and eight provinces gathered in Toronto for the 4th International Conference on UV and Skin Cancer Prevention.

A joint planning committee consisting of the Canadian Dermatology Association, Ryerson University, and Klein Buendel, Inc. organized the meeting.

The conference featured 84 presentations spanning a wide range of subject areas, from sun protection for outdoor workers to trends in indoor tanning and tanning behaviours.

Dr. Julie Powell gave the welcome speech to attendees to kick off the conference. Dr. Jennifer Beecker gave a keynote address alongside Dr. Boris Lushniak, former Surgeon General of the United States, on skin cancer prevention in Canada, which covered the work of the Association over the past several years to educate the public on sun-safe behaviours and prevention. Dr. Sunil Kalia presented the findings from the CDA Annual Sun Safety Behaviour Survey. Dr. Cheryl Rosen served as a member of the Scientific Committee.

SUN AWARENESS WEEK (SAW)

In recognition of SAW – Monday, May 28, 2018 to Sunday, June 3, 2018 – the CDA issued daily press releases on various sun-related topics including the Annual Sun Safety Behaviour Survey results, sunscreen safety, free sun-safety resources, impact of sun exposure (targeting teens), Vitamin D, outdoor worker resources and World Skin Health Day.

To increase the probability of coverage, media outlets were contacted in advance and were given a summary of what to expect for the week ahead. CDA members did many interviews across the country with various media outlets including Global News, CTV, CKNW980 Radio, CBC, and Chatelaine.

In addition to targeting traditional media, the CDA shared the SAW press releases, sun-safety messaging, media interviews and resources across the Association's social media platforms. During the three weeks surrounding SAW, the CDA received 41,384 impressions and 1,283 post engagements on Facebook. On Twitter there were 213 post engagements, 47 mentions gained and 28 new followers.

A variety of new sun safety resources were created and launched in May during SAW for use by the public including parents, teachers

and public-health units. These resources are available free of charge on the CDA website. An additional resource, based on the national consensus on sun-safety messages in Canada, was also created for members to ensure consistent use of messaging across the country. SAW-related materials were emailed to all members and hard copies followed in the mail before the kick-off of this weekly event.

WORLD MELANOMA DAY (WMD)

In acknowledgement of World Melanoma Day (WMD) on Monday, May 14th, the CDA hosted its first Facebook Live event. Dr. Julie Powell and Dr. Jennifer Beecker did a live video stream from the CDA National office to talk to Canadians about skin cancer prevention, sun-safety tips and answer questions from viewers. Also, the CDA undertook a traditional media and social media outreach push leading up to WMD, resulting in a number of member interviews across the country with media outlets including CTV, News 1130 Vancouver, Global News, Toronto Star, Chronicle of Skin and Allergy and more. Stories were rebroadcasted and republished on major outlets such as The Weather Network Online, 1310 News Ottawa and Global News Online.

During the two weeks surrounding WMD CDA received 37,028 impressions and 1,072 post engagements on Facebook. On Twitter, CDA received 169 post engagements, 41 mentions and gained 25 new followers.

WORLD SKIN HEALTH DAY (WSHD)

In awareness of World Skin Health Day, a collaborative initiative between the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS) and the International Society of Dermatology (ISD), dermatologists and dermatology residents hosted a free public skin-cancer screening clinic in Vancouver, BC on Saturday, June 9th. Dermatologists and residents screened the public, did media interviews, answered questions, handed out educational materials and talked about skin cancer prevention.

The CDA was involved in seven events across the country, including the Winnipeg Teddy Bear Picnic, World Melanoma Day in Ottawa, Vancouver Public Screening, Sudbury Public Screening, Moncton Public Screening, Toronto Public Screening, and a Sun Awareness Station in London.

RESIDENTS AND FELLOWS SOCIETY

The Canadian Dermatology Association Residents and Fellows Society (CDA-RFS) was established in 2004 and serves as a collective national voice for dermatology residents across Canada. Two co-chairs and 16 resident representatives from the nine Canadian dermatology programs oversee the CDA-RFS. The goals of the Society include promoting resident camaraderie across programs, strengthen participation in the CDA, spearhead resident-centred programming and initiatives, and enhance the training experience of dermatology residents.

The 2018 CDA Annual Conference took place in Montreal, QC, from June 20-23, 2018. We were delighted by strong resident attendance from anglophone and francophone programs. There were several valuable networking opportunities for residents including the speed networking event and the resident reception. The Basics of Skin Science (BoSS) lectures occurred at the beginning of the conference, and there was solid positive feedback from all residents in attendance about the continued excellent quality of these lectures. One new feature at the recent Annual Conference was an exam preparation session led by Drs. Kerri Purdy, Aaron Wong, Ashley O'Toole and Natalie Cunningham. Topics included study strategies, wellness during the exam year, and fellowship opportunities in photomedicine, cutaneous oncology, Mohs micrographic surgery, complex medical dermatology, research, and wound care. This preparation session was well-received by residents in all years, and we are very grateful to all organizers and participants for their time and involvement.

As is tradition, at the end of the CDA Annual Conference, the annual CDA-RFS Excellence in Resident Teaching Awards, as well as Excellence in Clinical Teaching awards, were presented by the CDA-RFS. This year's recipients of the Excellence in Resident Teaching Awards were Dr. Danya Traboulsi (University of Calgary), Dr. Ashley Sutherland (Dalhousie University), and Dr. Naif AlJahani (McGill University). The recipients of this year's Excellence in Clinical Teaching Awards were Dr. Mathieu Powell (Université de Montréal), and Dr. Julie Prendiville (University of British Columbia).

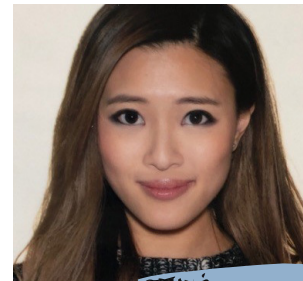
One of the initiatives the RFS has been spearheading with the CDA Board of Directors, Basics of Skin Science (BoSS) directors, and Canadian Professors of Dermatology, is the creation of a Canada-wide database of material such as podcasts and lectures for all Canadian dermatology residents. The idea behind this was that there are many areas of expertise at different centres (e.g., contact dermatitis, wound healing, cosmetics, etc.) that could be shared so that all Canadian residents can benefit. Dr. Kerri Purdy, President-Elect of the CDA, who also sits on the CDA Board of Directors, Canadian Professors of Dermatology, and who works closely with BoSS, has been taking great initiative with this, and we are very grateful to her for all the hard work and quick progress that has been made. The tentative timeline is a set of podcasts being completed within the next few months. We know that dermatology residents across the country have expressed great excitement in anticipation of this resource.

We would also like to congratulate newly graduated residents from all Canadian training programs. The Society aims to promote CDA membership as valuable to new dermatology graduates. This past year there was a high proportion of new members that just completed residency, and we hope to see this trend continue.

We feel very energized by the resident-centred projects occurring within the CDA and look forward to maintaining this momentum going forward.
